Things have been happening along Cypress Street during this last year. The offices of Parents and Friends, have several new neighbors. The Redwood Health Club has been extensively remodeled and reincarnated as the Mendocino Sports Club. Accu-Tech Auto Repair has opened a beautiful new shop across the street. Danco Builders have begun a Senior Housing project right next door.

Especially exciting to us, is the opening of the Mendocino Coast Pharmacy in our former Furniture Annex Building.



The building was built by Joe Moura in the early 1970's and was dedicated to one of PFI's founders, Dolores Scott. It has housed many of our businesses including a recycling center and a bakery.

Pharmacist Kelly Brodetsky, along with her husband Gary, leased the building and did a beautiful job of remodeling it to suit the needs of their full service pharmacy.

The Brodetskys have operated the Mendocino Village Pharmacy for 11 years. It is now located in Harvest at Mendosas on Lansing Street in Mendocino.

In their new shop, they provide prescription and non-prescription drugs as well as home health medical equipment. They can order wheel chairs, walkers, commodes, hospital beds and much more and in most cases have them delivered the next day. They offer free delivery of all purchases.

The Brodetskys believe in friendly, caring service and a commitment to their community. Gary has a background in non-profit finance and they have a heart for the non-profit organizations in our community.

Kelly and Gary believe that home owned businesses have the unique opportunity to support their community. Their dream, when they get the pharmacy established as a profitable business, is to start a foundation with the profits. They hope to be able share funds with local non-profit organizations. ### A View from the Moon by Rick Moon

Peter F. Drucker, in Managing the Non-Profit Organization: Principles and Practices, described the role of the non-profit: "The 'non-profit' institution neither supplies goods or services nor controls. Its *product* is neither a pair of shoes nor an effective regulation. Its product is a changed human being. The non-profit institutions are human-change agents. Their *product* is a cured patient, a child that learns, a young man or woman grown into a self-respecting adult; a changed human life altogether."

Wow! What a job ... and what a responsibility! Who could do that? How do you go about it? "A changed human being"? "...human change agents"? "A changed human life altogether"? I thought about that a lot, but then I had to get back to work.

I met with Leann, manager of the Community Connection and 24-7 Supported Living, about a new client for each of her programs. I then met with Printha, manager of the Job Connection, about two clients looking for jobs in the community and a successful placement of a client in a job at Safeway. Later I met with Amanda, manager of the Paul Bunyan Thrift Store, about the transition of new group employment clients at the store. The next morning I met with Kristie, L.I.F.E. program manager, about the passes to C.V. Starr Center which enable clients to exercise, swim and participate in the community, as

well as the Anime Club about to start meeting at a local bookstore, the Science Club, Empathy Training and the Money Matters class about budgeting, money handling, etc., and the progress made by one client in improving dexterity and communication through training and the use of an iPad. We also explored progress toward offering behavioral modification training through L.I.F.E. and the Community Connection, hopefully in the near future. Then I met with Sue Stever, the Supported Living manager, on how to manage the ever changing schedules of clients living in the community who rely on us for meals, medical appointments and supports, shopping, laundry and household upkeep, taxes, scheduling of IHSS services and so on.

I then returned to my office and on the computer screen was the Peter F. Drucker excerpt from Managing the Non-Profit Organization: Principles and Practices. I saw it in a new light. Yeah, that's what we do at Parents and Friends. We just don't think about it while we're doing it. I went back out to each program and just watched for a while, from the viewpoint of Mr. Drucker. I watched staff working with clients, and clients working with staff. It was clear both were learning something from the other, and that both felt that what they were learning was worthwhile. There was laughter; quiet, thoughtful discussion; teasing; disagreement and negotiated resolution.

I tried not to interrupt and returned to my office thinking "We've got the best employees in the world, and the best clients."

I like to end the View with a few quotes, so here goes:

# Traveling broadens your horizons ... and is also lots of fun!



They communicate with the trip staff regarding any particular special needs of the client. Coastal support staff assists clients in packing for the trip and escorts them back and forth from the airport.
