PFI to begin offering services on Chestnut Street



New windows, new flooring and bright new paint give building new life!

Parents and Friends recently acquired the Christian Science Church building on Chestnut Street in Fort Bragg. After taking ownership of the building, we have replaced windows and trim, removed and donated fixed seating to Gloriana Theatre Company, removed carpeting and replaced it with bright and beautiful linoleum that resembles wood flooring, added fresh paint to the interior and will be updating the rest rooms for ADA accessibility.

On top of that, we are in the process of installing a home exhibition-style learning kitchen and a laundry learning center where clients can sharpen up their independent living skills and learn about nutrition, meal planning and budgeting as well as laundry skills. The space is very nice and gives us the room to pursue special projects as necessary including computer instruction, reading literacy, evening social get togethers, and group meetings to learn about self-advocacy and practicing communication skills.

Dolores "Dodie" Scott of Fort Bragg passed away on Monday, Aug. 11, 2014, at Mendocino Coast District Hospital after a short illness. She left behind husband Wayne, son Rand, daughter-in-law Terri and numerous grandchildren and great grandchildren. Preceding her in death was her son Jeffrey who had Down Syndrome and, with his supportive family, changed many lives.

We knew Dodie best as the heart and soul of Parents and Friends. With Lotte Moise and volunteers, she started the Paul Bunyan School for developmentally disabled children. She was the first director of the Cypress Street Center. She took countless disabled adults on memorable trips across the United States and beyond. She made a difference.

Dodie was also well known for her love of travel and became a travel agent so she could share adventures with many others. She traveled across the Pacific in a homemade schooner, the Sabrina. She was a very active member of Noyo Women for Fisheries .

In the other, we will be learning how to prepare and cook healthy, nutritional food (some from the garden). In Supported Living we're pursuing a more clinical approach to services, including training for staff in providing services to aging clients including dementia care certification, diabetes nutritional planning and support and improving our systems for medication logging and tracking and medical appointment tracking and support.

We have also established relationships with Mendocino Coast Clinics, MCDH, Mendocino Coast Pharmacy; Fort Bragg Unified School District and local employers in an effort to integrate clients out into the community as well as integrating the community into PFI services. This collaboration is working extremely well and producing outcomes beyond our wildest hopes. We are also pursuing disability technology training to provide modern aids to our clients who need them.

Under the direction of our new Garden Manager, Gowan Batist, we will practice active seed saving and plant propagation, garden maintenance and harvesting from both our in-ground and raised bed gardens, designed for those who use mobility aids; as well as creating packaging and labeling, cooking from the garden, and some creative, seasonal activities to have as much fun as we can while honing these life-long skills. To support this venture, we plan to operate a Flower Bouquet CSA, where customers can pre-order a weekly Bouquet for a set price, as well as offer some of these items at the soon to be year-round Fort Bragg Farmer's Market, as well our own on site CSA store. 
Charles' in charge
